Proposed Nevada State Children's ATV Program

- Course be State Mandated (NRS Change) for all children age 6 to 16 riding ATV's/dirt bikes on public land.
 - If not mandatory state wide, then at least OHV friendly communities could mandate it as part of their regulations/ordinances, if they so choose.
 - Recommending two part program, one portion online, remaining portion in-person. Oregon and North Dakota both utilize two part program, online and in-person.
 - This not only ensures the kids complete the online portion but also allows the in person course to take less time, more appealing to students.
 - Currently the ASI program, that has no online component, runs 4 hours
 - We would propose the Nevada State version be 2 hours online and 2 hours in person
 - North Dakota is 1 hour online and 2.5 hours in person
 - This allows for more in person trainings to be taught in any given day, as there is a recommended max kids/training session
 - Training age groups are 6-11 (max 4 kids at time w/ASI), 12-15 (max 8 per time with ASI), 16+
 - Will have a harder time getting participants if it is not law...seen decline in participation in recent years. All other states referenced have mandatory requirement per their state law.

Course Outline:

- Formal ASI (ATV Safety Institute) Training similar format, but with modification for eliminating their age appropriate machine criteria and shifting to size appropriate (we will develop that criteria with area experts).
- o Curriculum already exists, just need to pick and choose what we want in the online course
 - Machine size appropriate vs Age appropriate
 - Hand signals for in town riding
 - Full trail etiquette
- Valid: It's a one-time course, or does it have an expiration

Delivery

- OHV Commission/State owns/hosts program and contracts to NOS to develop, oversee and deliver
 - NOS host program via grant or direct (outside of grant process)
 - NOS utilizes their staff and contracts with others to help deliver
 - Trains the trainer
 - Cooperative Extension
 - Contracts with others already trained in UTV/dirt bike/ATV
- Determine if online portion be hosted at NOS website or State OHV website
 - Currently have an offroad-ed Nevada website ready (for us to use) https://www.offroad-ed.com/nevada/
 - Utah hosts the course on their website (which links to atvcourse.com)

 - NOS would contract with Third party- "Fresh Air Educators" to develop website for the online component
 - NOS met Mike Dean @NOHVCC conference in Reno
 - Had phone meeting with him to discuss how his website works
 - Atvcourse.com (also an OHV site)
 - 11 states currently use including: Utah, Oregon, Idaho
- o Do we provide bikes for certification or require to bring their own?

- Can be future discussion start with kids bringing own bikes
 - If provide bikes who owns? Stores? How to get around state?
 - Humboldt County Sheriff's office has offered a storage location if we had the trailer to store and transport them in. Would need to be in a location NOS (and other future trainers) had access to during off hours.
- o Different levels of trainings based on who is being trained
 - Training Types:
 - Basic Rider Safety (Public)
 - Master Trainer (those who will run the courses/ Co-Op)
 - In addition they would offer training for Police, Fed/State agencies –but not part of this youth education program
- Fees:
 - Fee or Free? (most are \$29.95)
 - Up-front costs: \$4,000-5,000 for developing program, web set up, etc.
 - Annual fee: under \$10,000
 - Includes hosting, editing, customer service, demo breakdown, certificates
- Insurance: Would we want to pursue a discount or incentive for reduced insurance?
 - Utah does this
