The RIDE ON Nevada off-highway project has my approval as of June 16, 2016.

I am writing to express the U.S. Forest Service's support for Tread Lightly!'s request for funding from the 2016/2017 Nevada Commission on Off-Highway Vehicles (NCOHV) Grant Cycle. Also, please accept this letter as confirmation that Tread Lightly! is working with the Forest Service's Regional Office (R4) and the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest, to establish consistent messaging across National Forest lands in Nevada.

The catalyst for Tread Lightly!'s grant submission was to leverage funding recently committed from R4 matched with a seed grant received from the Forest Service's Washington Office to engage Tread Lightly!'s assistance to help meet U.S. Forest Service Performance Measures for Travel Management established by our Washington Office.

We have used this funding to establish a 5-year agreement with Tread Lightly!, in part, to enhance collaboration between R4, the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest and the NCOHV, as well as other state and federal land management agencies operating within the state of Nevada. Specifically, we've tasked Tread Lightly! with assisting the agencies in development and implementation of an education and outreach program to communicate, in concert, consistent messages promoting responsible use of motorized vehicles throughout the state.

Tread Lightly! also benefits our agencies by serving as a conduit to the private sector, including industry, nonprofit organizations and individuals and can help improve our cooperative relationships with these important stakeholders. Furthermore, as a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organization, Tread Lightly! can act as a mechanism to pool public and private resources resulting in a greater collective impact for all involved.

With an ever-growing and diverse population combined with dwindling resources, the time has never been greater than now to focus on collaboration and education to protect the public's access and opportunities to enjoy sustainable outdoor recreation while also protecting Nevada's world-class natural and cultural resources.

To this end, I truly hope the NCOHV will join the U.S. Forest Service in our expanding relationship with Tread Lightly! and augment our limited resources with OHV grant funding to operate more efficiently and cost-effectively together than independently.
