Friends of Nevada Wilderness will use volunteers to complete much of the work described for both projects listed below. We will recruit, train and manage the volunteers and ensure they are given the safety training necessary to complete these projects.

Hunter Lake Road Project

Scope of Work

In partnership with the OHV community, Friends of Nevada Wilderness volunteers will provide clear signing for the Hunter Lake Road with new carsonite signs and stickers with route markers and directional arrows. FNW will maintain all three visitor kiosks with a fresh coat of paint and replace any damaged 2X6 backing boards at the kiosks and post updated maps of the area and pertinent information to improve the visitor experience and aid in resource protection. FNW will create a new travel/informational map for the kiosks and prepare an on-line user map. Several vehicle switchback routes and unauthorized user created routes will be blocked off with dead and down material. FNW will use our John Deere 855 D-4 Gator that was paid for by the Recreational Trails Program to move volunteers and material to the work sites.

Silver State Trail/Big Rocks Wilderness Project

Scope of Work

This project seeks to keep users on designated routes and cherry stem roads and restore damage from illegally created routes in Wilderness. Restoration will involve planting dead and downed plant matter, loosening compacted soils, and re-contouring the ground surface to the surrounding environment. This work will restore damage and disguise the route to prevent future use. In some areas, access to illegally pioneered routes will also be blocked by installing vehicle fences/barriers. This work will be done on lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). Most of the labor to execute the projects will be completed by volunteers. This work will focus in two areas, described in detail below.

Working in partnership with the BLM, Friends of Nevada Wilderness and their volunteers will work to distinguish the boundaries between designated routes on the Silver State Trail

and the non-motorized area of Big Rocks Wilderness. Pioneered OHV routes going into Big Rocks Wilderness will be naturalized to disguise and discourage use. Approximately 450-feet of vehicle barriers, at four different locations, will be installed at the end of cherry stem roads that stem off of the Silver State Trail. The end of cherry stem barriers provides a clear indication of where the designated route ends, site where people can park to camp and/or hike as well as protects resources that people are there to enjoy. The materials being used for the barriers are remnants of a prior OHV commission grant. Materials were purchased but not installed because the BLM provided supplies that were not foreseen when applying for that grant cycle. We are committed to using those materials on OHV specific projects.

The volunteer projects will likely consist of three-day outings arriving to the site on Friday afternoons and departing on Sunday afternoons. To make the volunteer experience enjoyable Friends provides dinner and breakfast on overnight outings resulting in longer prep time that involves food planning and shopping. This will be the first time Friends has worked with the Caliente Field office in many years and have not worked in the Big Rocks Wilderness. There may need to be multiple field trips and meetings with the office to ensure that the goals of the BLM are met. Additionally, since a lot of the work consists of digging holes for posts, it is unknown how challenging the digging will be and if additional staff time will be required to complete the barriers as committed in the proposal.

These projects provide passive enforcement in the way of clearly showing users of where they may ride and where motorized use is prohibited. Placing new signs will aid law enforcement. Most riders want to want to do the right thing and proper signs will help them know where the trails are located.

Refurbing the three kiosks on the Hunter Lake Road and the creation and placement of user friendly maps will help visitors know where they are. The kiosks will also be updated with current Tread Lightly information. Preparing a digital trail guide for the Hunter Lake Trail can help users chose routes that best fit their vehicle's ability.

The Hunter Lake Road has several well-built kiosks that need maintenance. They need to be painted and board that are shot up need to be replaced. Creating and placing a good map of the area and the roads on the kiosks will help visitors know where the roads go and help them learn about the surrounding area. Route and information stickers need to be replaced so they area legible and well placed.



Closing off vehicle routes that cut the road switchback will help prevent erosion and the washing out of the road. Minor maintenance can go a long way to taking care of the road surface.

Neither of these projects include a hands on training component.

One goal of these projects is to help riders responsibly enjoy the area through clearly showing designated routes and elimination of illegally created routes. Minimizing and discouraging inappropriate motorized use will lessen impacts to resources, prevent conflict between various types of users, and continue to keep motorized access open near non-motorized use areas. Land management agencies, by legal mandate, must take action to stop irresponsible use. This can include road closures and loss of access to motorized users. As most visitors know, responsible use leads to keeping trails open.

It has been shown that outdoor recreation is a diverse and powerful part of the Nevada economy. People purchase OHV and hiking equipment, eat in restaurants and shop for miscellaneous items near their destination to their outdoor activity. This project will improve the recreation opportunities and distinguish boundaries for users. Signage along both the Silver State Trail and the Hunter Lake Road will prevent users from getting lost and prevent conflicts between users.

This project will advertise the Silver State Trail to Las Vegans. Outreach will be done to recruit volunteer from the communities nearest to the project site, such as Caliente, but it's expected that many volunteers will be from Las Vegas. These volunteers will be exposed to the recreational opportunity of the Silver State Trail and encouraged to return again and visit on their own.

For the Hunter Lake project outreach will be done to recruit volunteers from the Reno area from both the OHV community and the Wilderness communities.

Our volunteer match for the Silver State//Big Rocks Project is expected to be: \$5,733 from volunteer in-kind labor and mileage.









Hunter Lake Road Project

We are happy to respond with a letter of support for the OHV barrier project. Within the BLM Caliente Field Office, we face increasing challenges as tourism, both motorized and non-motorized, continues to grow in Lincoln County. Over the next several years, we will complete construction on 45 miles of new non-motorized trails, including trailheads and other improvements; illustrating the growing demand on our local public lands. We continue to see increasing tourism from both OHV and mountain bike users. We are responding to the increased use with barriers and signage along our wilderness boundaries to keep visitors out of trouble and to preserve the naturalness of the wilderness.

The Friends of Nevada Wilderness group proposes to install OHV barriers along the Big Rocks Wilderness. The Silver State Trail runs along the southern, western and northern sections of the wilderness and in several areas incursions have occurred. Multiple cherry-stems on the western side have been blown out because of unusually heavy thunderstorm activity, causing an undefined boundary that has led to further incursions.

This project would better define motorized routes and the end of designated routes (cherry-stem roads) by installing barriers and naturalizing illegal routes. These type of actions have been analyzed in the Big Rocks Wilderness Management Plan and associated Environmental Assessment, and BLM supports the OHV barrier project proposed by Friends of Nevada Wilderness.

This letter is in support of Friends of Nevada Wilderness request for grant funding. Install and replacing carsonite signs along motorized trails are categorically excluding from NEPA and under the National Historic Preservation Act.
