The HCSO will continue hosting Rider Safety Education classes for the public. The instructors are certified through the MSF Dirt Bike School, and the Recreational Off-Highway Vehicle Association (ROHVA). For this grant we pledge to host a minimum of four classes each for Dirt Bike's, and Side by Sides within 2022-2023 in partnership with Nevada Outdoor School.

Through focused patrols, and in addition to normal patrols, we will spend a minimum of 500 hours in OHV specific recreation areas for compliance, enforcement, and education purposes. This will include tuition for HCSO personnel to attend further OHV specific classes.

During each individual traffic stop with any OHV user, HCSO law enforcement personnel will continue to check for proper OHV registration and VIN verification. Deputies have been taught NRS 490 laws and have actively made OHV stops while conducting routine patrol functions.

Funds for NV OHV marketing/promotional items are sought after to help increase the exposure to OHV registration, which is a main goal and focus of the HCSO. Items such as toolkits to help the public conduct pre-and-post ride TCLOCS inspections of their OHVs will allow the potential exposure to other non-registered users to register their OHVs with the state.

2. Enhancement or Maintenance of existing trails and facilities: Describe the maintenance intervals for your project. How will maintenance needs be prioritized and how often will your project hold a maintenance/trails enhancement event? HOW will your project be maintained and WHO has committed to the ongoing maintenance of the facility or trail. (note: a minimum of 2 maintenance/trail events are required per year)

The HCSO will continue to work alongside with the Nevada Outdoor School and local OHV/ATV clubs within our community in conjunction with their proposed projects (including trails and facilities maintenance).

3. Training: Please describe the goals and objectives of your public training program, i.e., Public Education, Rider Classes, Safety, Trail Building, or Outdoor Ethics. Number of people trained, contacts made, etc.

The HCSO will continue to provide safety courses for the public and other law enforcement agencies throughout the state. These courses for dirt bikes, side by sides, and ATVs are oriented for entry level knowledge in the basics and safe practices for the operation of these machines. To date, the HCSO has trained over 80 participants for both side by side and dirt bike operation. Participants not only learn basic operational skills, but educational skills of trail maintenance, sharing trails with others, and outdoor ethics. We look forward to continuing our educational classes for all to attend.

Existing trails will be utilized by the HCSO when conducting enforcement patrols.

HCSO will utilize existing trail systems, roads and recreation facilities to provide educational outreach and safety trainings. Utilizing the surrounding trails and recreation areas will promote a vested interest in county and other public lands to keep them clean and safe for generations.

6. Planning, Environmental Studies, Conservation: Describe how the environmental studies, conservation and/or planning will mitigate resources impacted by OHV recreation. How will your project contribute to the conservation of our natural resources?

Humboldt County, Nevada has thousands of miles of existing trails and road to experience the joy of off-roading with family and friends. With the education and outreach events, we will coordinate with local outdoor enthusiast groups and land management agencies to insure these public use areas remain open for off-roading experiences.

Irresponsible recreation, including harm done by OHV and Dirt Bike users, causes a variety of impacts to our public lands and county trails and roads. With continued education and outreach with registration events and safety trainings, we will insure open public areas remain open for generations. Any questions or concerns about access to any trails/roads in Humboldt County can be addressed by HCSO personnel.

The HCSO will continue to work closely with local OHV groups wherever possible. We believe a strong working relationship is necessary for any/all OHV users in our community to recreate responsibly and safely.

Through our local OHV enforcement efforts, deputies have spoken to numerous out-of-state OHV users who have traveled to Humboldt County specifically to recreate. They cited high or unsafe OHV usage in other states and decided to recreate out of state. This stimulates our local economy by means of spending at our local stores and casinos.

4 STATEMENT OF WORK

PERFORMANCE WORK STATEMENT FOR SERVICES HUMBOLDT COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE AND

BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT OFFICE OF LAW ENFORCEMENT AND SECURITY


The services requested by the BLM are of an extraordinary nature outside the scope of the Humboldt County Sheriff's normal and routine law enforcement activities on the public lands.

The Humboldt County Sheriff will enforce the civil and criminal laws of the State and/or county on the public lands, waters, roads, and trails administered by the BLM with reimbursement by the BLM, in accordance with the actual costs associated with conducting these patrols, to include: current wages of law enforcement personnel, mileage and other vehicle costs associated with vehicle patrols, if necessary.

Sworn personnel assigned to duties under this contract will be regular employees of the County Sheriff's Department who have complied with the minimum standards as required by the Nevada State Police Officers Standards and Training Council; and that such officers shall not be in violation of the provisions of 18 U.S.C. 922, which prohibits persons convicted of a misdemeanor domestic violence crime from possessing firearms or ammunition.


- 1. Provide reimbursable services as listed, for the enforcement of State and local laws relating to the protection of persons and property on the public lands. The lack of any specific request by BLM will not limit the authority of the Sheriff to respond to any situation in a fashion seen fit under State or local law.
 - A. The Sheriff agrees to provide adequate patrols through Water Canyon, Bloody Shins Trail Area and the Sand Dunes during high use days. The high use days, number of patrol Deputies and the hours of patrol will be determined by coordinating efforts between the Bureau Designated Representative, Winnemucca District Ranger Randy Reader, and the County Sheriff's Department POC.
 - B. The Sheriff agrees that during the high use patrols, the deputies will take the lead in the enforcement of violations which are better addressed by the NRS, specifically, Driving Under the Influence (DUI) violations, Juvenile violations like Minors in Possession of Alcohol (MIP) and assaults.
 - C. The Sheriff agrees, when officer availability allows it, to provide Deputy responses to the all public lands within Humboldt County when requested by the public and/or BLM, when deputies are not present in the areas.
 - D. When requested by the BLM, the Sheriff agrees to dispatch additional sworn deputies, within work force capabilities, to assist in special operations (i.e., marijuana eradication, special events, execution of warrants) or for other unforeseen or emergency situations.
 - E. The Sheriff will have the Deputies coordinate with the District Ranger Reader, regarding patrol needs and to exchange law enforcement information of benefit to both the Sheriff and the BLM.
 - F. The Sheriff agrees to authorize BLM LEOs to use Sheriff Office radio frequencies when working within Humboldt County.
- 2. Ensure that sworn personnel assigned to duties on Public Lands be made aware of the provisions of the Archaeological Resources Protection Act (16 U.S.C. 470 aa 470 ll) and the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (25 U.S.C. 3001 3013), regarding skeletal remains. Also, ensure that the County Sheriff's personnel conducting the patrols, are instructed that, if possible, not to disturb what possibly may be an archaeological site, on the belief that the presence of skeletal remains is indicative of a crime scene over which they have jurisdiction, without first checking with appropriate BLM LEO and District management personnel.
- 3. The Humboldt County Sheriff will furnish District Ranger Reader, bi-annual reports of all noted law enforcement activities related to: (1) Number of patrols made and miles traveled; (2) hours worked; (3) arrests made on public lands- misdemeanors and felonies; (4) incidents investigated or responded to; (5) assistance given to BLM personnel.
