Great Basin Institute, in cooperation with the US Forest Service Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest is requesting funding to enhance OHV recreational opportunities and the safety of OHV enthusiasts. Project efforts will focus on completing corridor maintenance on motorized

trails/routes across multiple Ranger Districts. Emphasis will be placed on routes identified as priorities by US Forest Service staff and public feedback, with consideration to recreational use and current maintenance needs.

This project will fund one 5-person Nevada Conservation Corps chainsaw crew to support completion of road/trail corridor clearing projects that will focus on removing trees and brush currently affecting user safety and the ability for mechanized project equipment to access the site. In total, we are requesting funds to support (18) 8-day work tours, providing 7,560 labor hours of project support.

This project is part of a larger initiative by GBI and USFS Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest to improve the experience and safety of recreational visitors across the state of Nevada. In 2021, GBI received \$90,000 through the State of Nevada Recreational Trails Program (RTP) to complete 18 weeks of maintenance on both motorized and non-motorized trails in the Ruby Mtn and Santa Rosa Ranger Districts, as well as the Spring Mtns National Recreation Area. GBI has also applied to RTP for Phase 2 of this project to focus on non-motorized trails.



This project does not currently have a law enforcement strategy that addresses registration enforcement.

2. Enhancement or Maintenance of existing trails and facilities: How will maintenance needs be prioritized and how often will your project hold a maintenance/ trails enhancement event? The focus of this project is to maintain existing OHV trails/routes across the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest to address access and user safety concerns. Sections of the trails/routes are overgrown with brush, pinyon-juniper trees, and alder/willow thickets, making travel difficult and unsafe. Furthermore, significant route condition issues will be documented by the NCC Crew and reported to USFS for reference in identifying future maintenance projects. As evidenced in the attached transmittal letter, this project has the full support of the US Forest Service Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest.

3. Training: Please describe the goals and objectives of your public safety training program. Is it a nationally recognized certification? What sets your safety training program apart from the others?

This project does not have a public training program component.

4. Trail mapping and signing of existing trails and facilities: If a mapping component is included in the grant, please describe how it will be integrated with the current web mapping application found on OHV.NV.GOV

All USFS trails/routes associated with this project are part of the Humboldt-Toiyabe's Motorized Vehicle Use Map and included on the OHV.NV.GOV web mapping application. After completing maintenance projects, the team will collect map data. This data will generate an Avenza KMZ files and ArcGIS shapefiles for the Nevada Mapping Collaborative team to publish on the OHV.NV.GOV web mapping application. Information on trail condition and maintenance needs will be provided to USFS and the Nevada Mapping Collaborative to be stored in the statewide comprehensive trails database for future reference and prioritization of maintenance projects.

5. Connectivity/Loops: How will the project impact connectivity of OHV trails, facilities, and local communities? Please include maps of areas impacted by your project and describe those impacts.

This project will maintain USFS trails/routes that connect with a diverse system of motorized and non-motorized trails. Please refer to attached project maps for each Ranger District for illustration of the complex connectivity of the OHV routes to be prioritized.

6. Planning, Environmental Studies, Conservation: Describe how the environmental studies, conservation and/or planning will mitigate resources impacted by OHV recreation. How will your project contribute to the conservation of our natural resources, while enhancing OHV opportunities?

The maintenance focus for this project is to address motorized trail corridors that have become overgrown with brush and trees. Improving current road and trail conditions will contribute to habitat conservation by providing users with a safe route that limits impact in a defined area and discourages creation of renegade trails. As the roads and trails become impassable, users will begin to create their own paths to circumvent access issues and safety hazards, thus potentially damaging environmentally sensitive areas.

7. Access: Please describe how your project improves OHV access in the project area. Explain what access/opportunities would be lost or restricted if the project does not occur.

This project will focus on improving access to the existing OHV route and trail system. The impacts of vegetation growth into the corridor are endangering access to important recreational opportunities due to safety concerns. If left unaddressed, future access could be lost or highly discouraged due to hazardous conditions.





Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest OHV Trail/Route Maintenance











H-T NF OHV Trail/Route Maintenance: Carson





H-T NF OHV Trail/Route Maintenance: Bridgeport







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






H-T NF OHV Trail/Route Maintenance: Santa Rosa







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






H-T NF OHV Trail/Route Maintenance: Mtn City-Jarbidge







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





H-T NF OHV Trail/Route Maintenance: Austin-Tonopah


