If applicable, please explain how this project will aid with managing user interactions:

LVMPD EAC Resident Officers will conduct committed proactive enforcement and provide an educational platform, including, materials to the public, enthusiasts, and tourists during planned events. Several of our popular recreational locations host multiple events. Not all events are off-highway vehicles (OHV) dominant; however, all events have a very large OHV culture, presence, atmosphere and user interaction. Balancing enforcement with education and community engagement will foster a culture of compliance while enhancing community relations.

If funded, the LVMPD OHV program would significantly enhance our initiative in several ways; including, increased accessibility; enhanced safety; skill development; community engagement, and economic benefits locally.

Overall funding for a new OHV would enhance LVMPD program's reach, effectiveness, and sustainability; benefiting participants, users, and the community.

Proposed Scope of Work

The LVMPD Enterprise Area Command (EAC) Stateline Resident Section will provide a platform for all laws involving the registration and operation of off-highway vehicles (OHV) in Clark County. Our scope of work is designed to ensure compliance, enhance road safety, and maintain accurate OHV records by utilizing pre-planned events, public education campaigns, and citations for violations encouraging forced compliance to our laws.

Our OHV events and community have grown and expanded over the years and our program will reflect that; including, promoting the interests of the community, presentation, messaging and professionalism. Proactive enforcement of registration violations will be established and maintained in and around Sandy Valley, Goodsprings, Jean Dry Lakebed, Sloan, Lovell Canyon, Carpenter Canyon, Wheeler Pass, Red Rock Canyon Conservation, and Primm Valley Nevada.

Primm Valley also hosts very large OHV events every year; including, WORCS Racing; SNORE Racing; Mint 400; SNORE Battle at Primm; Silver State 300 Time Trials; Sunland Shamrock; Vegas to Reno Time Trials; Great American Short Course; WORCS Racing; Legacy Racing, and Primm Take Over (Illegal event from Mexico and California with no oversight).

The vehicle identification number (VIN) inspection and registration projects will be conducted by officers assigned to the Stateline Resident Section. They will coordinate efforts and event inspections for off-highway vehicle users with rangers assigned to the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) when available at popular destinations. For those not in compliance, citations will be given and a complete VIN inspection during the stop, along with necessary documentation to complete the registration process.

Our work environment demonstrates extremes geographically and in weather. We want to create a modeled enforcement program for other resident sections across the county and their agencies. Having a self-contained OHV and essential equipment the officers can utilize and operate for long periods is paramount. Because of our operational needs and work environment, officers need to function as if they were in their department-issued police truck; without being in their police truck.

Why is this important?

OHVs are specifically designed for off-road conditions, providing better maneuverability and access to remote areas where our police trucks may struggle.

OHVs can free up police resources for other duties, allowing Stateline officers to focus on more pressing community safety issues while still promoting OHV safety.

OHVs can serve as a more approachable tool for community engagement, allowing for more interactive safety demonstrations and training sessions that resonate with the outdoor community.

OHVs can be more visible and recognizable in off-road settings, helping to promote safety and awareness among riders in their natural environment.

OHVs allows LVMPD to conduct targeted safety and operational training that is directly relevant to off-road use, fostering a culture of responsible riding.

Using an OHV for outreach can improve community relations, showing a commitment to recreation safety rather than enforcement, which can sometimes create tension.

Overall, the dedicated use of an OHV enhances our ability to promote safety, engage the community, and effectively address any unique challenges associated with OHV use.

When awarded OHV grant, the funds will be used to purchase an off-highway vehicle and equipment included. The OHV will be housed it in a full-size Conex storage container located in the Jean Metro Station Parking lot; protecting it from the elements while always being readily available for deployment (photo attached).

Project Deliverables

Our quantitative outcome is produced as a result of this project will come from proactive enforcement while creating an educational platform. Officers will work a minimum 10 hours monthly in the above-listed areas; including, large OHV events for all eight quarters.

While conducting proactive enforcement and creating an educational platform, officers will issue citations and have informal conversations to educate the public regarding unregistered OHVs, as well

as conduct VIN inspections during the stop to assist the owner during the OHV registration process and providing literature and educational material regarding Nevada Revised Statue (NRS) 490 and 484.

Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 490 and 484 deal with different aspects of state law, particularly in relation to motor vehicle regulations. Key points we need to address are registration requirements; renewal processes; penalties for failure to register or maintain registration; traffic laws and responsibilities for users; safety measures; including, seat belt laws and guidelines for DUI, speeding, and other violations.

Quantitative outcomes for enforcing registration can be measured across several dimensions; compliance rates; number of registrations; citations Issued, and recidivism rates. By tracking these numbers, we can better understand the effectiveness of our registration enforcement efforts and make informed decisions regarding future strategies.

Developing a law enforcement strategy for OHV registration enforcement involves several key components ensuring compliance while maintaining community relations.

The LVMPD Stateline Resident Section will provide enforcement and educational platforms for all laws involving the registration and operation of any off-highway vehicles (OHV) in Clark County and/or large OHV events. This will also include search & rescue for lost or injured OHV users, body recoveries and off-road fatal accident investigation involving OHVs.

The strategies behind this project are assessment and planning; targeted enforcement; outreach and education, and collaboration with the communities. This will not only enforce public compliance using law enforcement means, but also enforces an increase in awareness, culture and safety with promoting and presence. Integrating these strategies, the new OHV will play a crucial role in enhancing safety and fostering a culture of awareness within the community.

We are also considering a temporary program encouraging users to register without penalty for past non-compliance. Successful programs like this can be measured through increased inquiries and OHV registrations following this type of campaigning event. Hosting these events will also assist users with registration requirements and show the benefits of compliance while also maintaining a safety message and highlighting responsible riding behavior.

After each project, officers will complete the Law Enforcement Statistics Reporting Form. This will assist in the grant tracking compliance of owners and operators regarding registration, moving and equipment violations; creating a measurable result that can be expressed in numerical terms via the current computer-aided dispatch (CAD) reporting systems and manual tracking by Law Enforcement Support Technicians (LEST) and Area Command Information Officer (ACIO) assigned to the Enterprise Area Command. This will allow us to evaluate the effectiveness of the strategy and adjust based on community feedback and data analysis.

Quarterly reports will be sent to the OHV Commission, as well as the LVMPD chain of command documenting the following; number of contacts regarding OHV registration, number of OHV-related citations issued; number of OHV services and educational material provided on OHV laws and safety, including the number of VIN inspections completed; number of man hours worked on OHV activities/enforcement, and conducted pre-planned VIN inspection events in Sandy Valley, Goodsprings, and Primm Valley Nevada, which will include partnering with BLM Rangers. While collaborating with other agencies and safety organizations, we can use the OHV in joint efforts to raise awareness about local laws and regulations regarding OHV use.

LVMPD's collective goals and objectives are to increase the knowledge and skill set of the public; by using forced compliance with citations and onsite VIN inspections, as well as fostering an educational platform using non-forced compliance with literature, educational materials, informal conversations and increased public exposure allowing us to expand our OHV enforcement and educational program using a measured and balanced approach.

Additionally, we have coordinated with Primm Valley Hotels to have our OHV on booth display for the public during large OHV events; providing an educational platform with a great presentation, literature and educational materials; including, having informal conversations with a public outreach mindset regarding safety, laws, expectations and the distribution or demonstration of essential safety gear and emphasizing its importance in preventing accidents.

We also will hold an OHV school assembly at Sandy Valley Rural High School. The assembly is coordinated by the Clark County Rural Commissioner Liaison and Red Bull Racing. It visually showcases different kinds of OHVs and equipment to the students. Sandy Valley has a large OHV community, and this is in response to increasing concerns regarding OHV safety, rules and regulations within their township and County of Clark. The new OHV can serve as a platform for hands-on training sessions, teaching students safe operation techniques, proper gear usage, and emergency response strategies.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT AND THE LAS VEGAS METROPOLITAN POLICE DEPARTMENT

L PURPOSE

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) provides for the increased protection of persons and property on the public lands and roads administered by the United States Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management (BLM), through cooperation between the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (LVMPD) and the BLM.

Both parties desire to cooperate in law enforcement/search and rescue activities and agree that such cooperation will result in both a reduction in response time and cost to the public, and will promote the welfare, safety, enjoyment of visitors, residents by establishing a consistent and uniform application of enforcement through the most efficient utilization of resources where they exist and are in place, thereby eliminating unnecessary and/or conflicting duplication of effort, and facilitating respective agency missions and responsibilities.

IL AUTHORITY

A. Bureau of Land Management

Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 (FLPMA), 43 U.S.C. 1742 When is her judgment sufficient search, rescue, and protections forces are not otherwise available, the Secretary is authorized in cases of emergency to incur such expenses as may be necessary (a) in searching for and rescuing, or in cooperating in the search for and rescue of, persons lost on the public lands (b) in protection of rescuing, or in cooperating in the protection and rescue of, persons or animals endangered by an act of God, and (c) in transporting deceased persons or persons seriously ill or injured to the nearest place where interested parties or local authorities are located.

FLPMA, 43 U.S.C. 1733(d) provides that, in connection with the administration and regulation of the use and occupancy of the public lands, the Secretary is authorized to cooperate with the regulatory and law enforcement officials of any State or political subdivision thereof in the enforcement of the laws or ordinances of such State or subdivision.

B. Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department

Nevada Revised Statute (NRS) 248.090, Provides that the Sheriff and their deputies shall keep and preserve the peace in their respective counties, and quiet and suppress all affrays, riots insurrections, for which purpose, and for the service of process in civil or

criminal cases, and in apprehending or securing any person for felony, or breach of the peace, they may call upon the power of their county to aid in such arrest or in preserving the peace.

NRS) 248.092, Provides the Sheriff is responsible for searches and rescues within his or her county.

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. Public Lands- any land and interest in land owned by the United States within the several States and administered by the Secretary of the Interior, through the BLM with regard to how the United States acquired ownership, except:
 - 1. Lands located on the outer Continental Shelf
 - 2. Lands held for the benefit of Indians, Aleuts, and Eskiroos 43 U.S.C., 1702(e)
- B. Law Enforcement Officer (LBO)—Law Enforcement Ranger and Special Agents employed by the BLM who have been delegated law enforcement authority by the Director, BLM
- C. State Director- The State Director, BLM, Nevada
- D. Special Agent-io-Charge (SAC)- SAC for the Office of Law Enforcement and Security, Region 3 (UT/NV)
- E. LVMPD-Sheriffs of counties and or metropolitan police departments, their deputies, and correctional officers

IV. Procedures

- A. The Sheriff of Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department has the authority to enforce the State and local laws for Nevada on such public lands administered by the BLM that lie within the confines of Clark County.
- B. The State Director, SAC, and the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department bareby mutually agree that it is desirable to cooperate and collaborate in better utilizing the resources of both agencies while providing for more adequate protection of persons and property on the public lands in Clark County as follows:

- The LVMPD Sheriff agrees to continue to enforce civil and criminal laws for the State of Nevada on the public lands, waters, roads, and trails administered by the BLM.
- 2. Where able and authorized by BLM, the BLM agrees to respond to requests for assistance from LVMPD.
- 3. BLM agrees to detain persons suspected of violating Nevada State laws, Clark County regulations or ordinances, any witnesses to those violations, and to protect any related crime scene, pending arrival of the state or local agency having primary jurisdiction. This pertains only to public lands.
- 4. BLM agrees to detain persons who are fugitives from justice and when requested by LVMPD, will transport to nearest correctional facility.
- 5. BLM agrees to allow LVMPD access to training on public lands for pilot and search and rescue crew training.
- 6. LVMPD agrees to contact BLM 7 days prior to conducting training on the belipads located at the Red Rock Fire Station and Red Rock Overlook, during fire season between May and September due to possible conflicts with fire suppression assets.
- 7. LVMPD Sheriff and the BLM mutually agree to provide the maximum cooperation, assistance, and coordination possible, within the availability of funds and established laws, regulations, and polices governing the respective agencies. This will assure the protection of persons and property on the public lands, waters, roads, and trails administered by the BLM within the confines of Clarke County.

V. Scope and Conditions

- A. Neither party shall be liable to the other. Nor to its agents or employees for any loss, damage, personal injury, or death occurring in consequence of the performance of this MOU, except as provide herein.
- B. No member of, or delegate to Congress, or State Official, shall be admitted to any share or part of this MOU, or any benefit that may arise there from.
- C. BLM LEO's will remain under the supervision and responsibility of the BLM. The BLM shall not be considered as coming within the scope of the LVMPD employment and none of the benefits of LVMPD will be conferred under this MOU.

- D. During the performance of this MOU, the participants agree to abide by the terms of Executive Order 11246: nondiscrimination and will not discriminate against any person because of race, color, religion, sex, age, disability, or national origin. The participants will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, age, disability, or national origin.
- B. Each party will furnish written information occessary for mutual enforcement operations.
- F. Any issues which cannot be reconciled between LVMPO and individual BLM LEOs or any issue that affects either party's performance under this MOU shall be referred to the SAC. The SAC will be responsible for coordinating with the appropriate officials to mutually resolve any issue.
- G. Nothing in this MOU will be construed as affecting the authorities of either party or as binding beyond their respective authorities.
- H. Nothing in this MOU shall obligate the BLM to expend, appropriate or to enter any contract or other obligation. Specific work projects or activities that involve the transfer of funds, service, or property between the parties to this MOU will require the execution of separate agreements or contracts, contingent upon the availability of funds as appropriated by Congress. Each subsequent agreement or arrangement involving the transfer of funds, service, or property shall be made in writing and shall be independently authorized by appropriate statutory authority and regulations, including those applicable to procurement activities.
- I. Subject to availability of funds, each party agrees to fund their own expenses associated with the implementation of this MOU. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as obligating the BLM to any expenditure or obligation of funds in excess or in advance of appropriations, in accordance with the Anti-Deficiency Act, 31 U.S.C. § 1341.
- J. Any records or documents generated because of this MOU shall be part of the official BLM record maintained in accordance with applicable BLM Records Management policies. Any request for release of records associated with the implementation of this MOU to anyone outside the parties must be determined based on applicable laws, including the Freedom of Information Act and the Privacy Act.
- K. This MOU shall be effective from the date of execution and shall remain in effect for one year, unless terminated with a 60-day written notice from either party to the other party. This MOU may be modified or arrended upon request of either party and written concurrence of the other party.

Dear To Whom It May Concern,

The Resident Section of the LVMPD EAC covers all the rural areas within County Commission District F. This represents an area of over 2,400 square miles with 10 different communities that range from the desert ranching towns, to mountain villages, and to resort areas. The area stretches from the California border on the south, to the Nye County line on the east, to the north side of the Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area and to the west side of S. Las Vegas Boulevard.

Much of the land within the area is remote and difficult to reach with regular vehicles. Around the desert communities of Sandy Valley, Goodsprings, and Calico Basin, there are very few paved roads and accessing remote locations can include traversing sand dunes, driving through washes, and over heavily rocked and rutted trails. In the mountain villages like Mountain Springs and Trout Canyon and areas like Lovell Canyon, the terrain is typical of alpine communities with rocky trails and forested areas. An OHV vehicle would allow Officers greater accessibility to these types of areas than ever before.

Throughout the United States, and most definitely here in Clark County, people are choosing to recreate on public lands more and more each year. This means that officers not only have to provide service to the residents of the area, they also must deal with people that come out to shoot, ride off-road, hike, climb, and recreate on our vast public lands. Typically, these adventurous activities take place in more remote areas that are not easily accessible by paved or gravel roads. An off-road vehicle would make responding to events in these situations faster and more efficient.

In the past few years, we have seen a marked increase in the number of complaints about conflicts between OHV users and area residents. Some of these conflicts have escalated to altercations between community members. We have already partnered with Sgt. Pickerel and his officers to work towards resolving some of these issues. We held an assembly for the Middle and High School students at Sandy Valley School to educate them on OHV use, laws, safety, and courtesy. In addition to Sgt. Pickerel and my rural liaison, Meggan Holzer, the presenters also included Off-Road Driver Bryce Menzies and BLM Law Enforcement Officers. The information was well received, and students talked about it for weeks afterwards. Having an increased presence in the off-road areas in and around our rural communities by our Metro officers would help to continue education and enforcement.

Providing coverage to this broad and diverse of an area is a daunting task. Sgt. Pickerel and his team of officers provide exemplary service with the vehicles and equipment they have now. The addition of an OHV to their resources will bring great benefit to the areas they serve, as well as to Clark County as a whole. I fully support this request and urge you to approve this grant for funding.
