Please explain how you intend to manage user interactions:

To create a safe staging areas for OHV (off-highway vehicles) towing vehicles and trailers at a prime egress points to trails in Nevada and Arizona. The staging areas will have kiosks with information pertinent to OHV travelers (maps, safety information, environmental protection and information regarding Mesquite sources of food, hotels etc.) toilets, security cameras, lighting, running water when possible and security fencing. It may include OHV marketing activities and materials and training for youth. It will mean more traffic on the city streets especially during large events. To facilitate this Mesquite should remove any restrictions on OHV travel on its streets.

This project dovetails very nicely with current Nevada OHV grants awarded Kokopelli ATV Club to place signage in Lincoln County, repair and improve the W. Access Rd. to Flattop Mesa and grants given to the Mesquite Police Department for enforcement of OHV laws.

This obviously would affect OHV traffic in BLM areas surrounding Mesquite. Projects and grants for signage, safety education, kiosks, and mapping will continue to make travel in the desert and mountains around Mesquite safer and more enjoyable for visitors. The sustainability costs will include maintenance of the staging areas to include restrooms, kiosks, lighting, security cameras, and potentially water in the staging areas. The return on investment will be considerable if various organizations stimulate large groups to visit Mesquite for OHV Jamborees etc. OHV use is growing at a very rapid pace. It should be understood that OHV includes dirt bikes, ATVs, UTV's (commonly known as side by sides), jeeps, four-wheel-drive high clearance vehicles, and pickups. This recreational opportunity is one of the few that has not been significantly adversely affected by COVID 19 because individuals naturally maintain separation from others while riding the trails and visiting interesting historical sites.

We would like to purchase some equipment as well to groom and maintain the trails that we have in Mesquite and will facilitate use in outer areas to keep trails safe and free from debris. The City will work cooperatively with volunteer groups to maintain trails and conduct clean ups and debris removal.

- 1. Law Enforcement Strategy that addresses registration enforcement, including Public Education & Outreach aimed at increasing renewals and new registrations: Our Kiosks will contain information on what is necessary to register a vehicle in Nevada and how that is currently done with our Mesquite Police Department. Also, the Kiosks will contain safety materials detailing what kind of supplies and equipment you need for your vehicle and the survival equipment necessary should you get stranded in the outlying areas. Once our staging areas are identified, that information will be made available on our website so that visitors will know where the safe and secure staging areas are around Mesquite. As far as patrolling and enforcement is concerned, this issue is being addressed by our Mesquite Police Department who has a current grant with the Nevada OHV Commission.
- 2. Enhancement or Maintenance of existing trails and facilities: The City of Mesquite Nevada has partnered with the Virgin River Coalition and the Kokopelli ATV Club. Currently the City of Mesquite is planning for 3 OHV staging areas in and around Mesquite Nevada. These staging areas support current OHV grants which placed approximately 600 signs in Lincoln and Clark County north of US 15 and the hardening (resistance to erosion) of the W. Access Rd off Flattop Mesa. One of the proposed staging areas is at the E. Access Rd. for Flattop Mesa which has a two-panel Kiosk with a Lincoln County OHV map which lists necessary OHV supplies and equipment along with important OHV safety instructions. This Kiosk is located on BLM land which is leased by the City of Mesquite. The Kiosk, which is now owned by the City of Mesquite, was built in cooperation with the Kokopelli ATV Club and the Clark County BLM with the Club's OHV grant. We intend to install even larger kiosks at our new staging areas which will include additional information on registration, Mesquite visitor information, etc.

The City of Mesquite is committed to not only providing the property for these staging areas (in-kind contribution) but maintaining them over the next 25 years which means regular pumping out the toilets, ongoing monitoring these areas with video cameras, regular (at least monthly) removing any trash and maintaining and cleaning the parking lots and restrooms, providing Wi-Fi services, and lighting these areas. Some of these

projects will include help and cooperation from our partners the Virgin River Coalition and the Kokopelli ATV Club. This grant will include maintenance and signage of the trail along the north side of the Virgin River, south of Mesquite. This will help eliminate conflicts with other recreational activities like hiking, nature studies, and biking in this area. Trail events may include regular volunteer events to patrol the trails in and around Mesquite and pick up and dispose of trash.

- 3. <u>Training:</u> The safety instructions for OHV'ers are an important part of preparing riders with information, supplies, and equipment necessary before they leave the city for a ride. This information will be included on all kiosks at all staging areas. Information will also be included on all kiosks about environmental protection, "Pack It In and Pack It Out", ride and trail etiquette. In addition, we can provide a location to have inclassroom training and on the do's and don'ts of trail riding and places to ride and not to ride. Some other things that the staging area could facilitate:
 - Bicycling
 - Hiking
 - Hunting
 - Nature Viewing
 - OHV Riding
 - Outdoor Learning
 - Rocks & Minerals (Geo Cashing Site)
 - Scenic Driving
 - Promoting Responsible Recreation & Environmental Stewardship
- 4. <u>Trail mapping and signing of existing trails and facilities:</u> We intend to provide maps of the trail next to the river. Maps could also be provided of key locations of businesses like restaurants, hotels, and places where people could get their vehicles serviced in Mesquite. The OHV Commission has a map of trails south and west of Mesquite into the Gold Butte area which can be accessed through their website and downloaded to someone's phone or tablet via the Wi-Fi at our staging areas. It ultimately could also be printed although some of the roads and trails are not yet marked (signed). Our kiosks will reference the Avenza map so that people in our staging areas could potentially use the Wi-Fi to download it to their phone or tablet.
- 5. <u>Connectivity/Loops:</u> The intent of this grant is to make Mesquite, Nevada an OHV destination. To do that, we will make the City OHV friendly by removing closures of streets that are currently unavailable for OHV use to make it easy for people with ATVs

and UTV's to access staging areas, parks, trailheads, fuel, food, and hotels. We will also work with the State of Nevada and Clark County to remove OHV restrictions from Nevada State Highway 170 making it easier for OHV and other recreators to access trails south and west of Mesquite including the Gold Butte Monument area.

- 6. Planning, Environmental Studies, Conservation: Since all of the properties involved in this project (with the exception of the trail next to the Virgin River) are on City or city-controlled property, the city itself will assure that they meet the environmental requirements. Also, the City's participation in and partnership with the Virgin River Coalition will help assure that this project dovetails with the Pollinator Garden and other environmental projects of the Virgin River Coalition. The OHV trail next to the Virgin River already exists even though it is not well marked. The identification and marking of this trail will move OHV traffic away from current birdwatchers, hikers and bikers. Since this trail exists in a floodplain, it will need to be remarked and maintained as the river changes course. Any signage or trail work in this area will be coordinated with the Clark County BLM office.
- 7. Access: Access is the prime objective of this grant application. Currently Mesquite does not have any formal staging areas for OHV-towing vehicles and trailers. This makes it very difficult for OHV visitors from outside Mesquite to safely and securely park their vehicles near trailheads. The Clark County Sheriff's office has already reported break-ins of vehicles left in unsecured areas near Mesquite. Also as mentioned earlier, the intent of this grant is to make Mesquite an "OHV Destination" where OHV visitors can easily travel anywhere in and around Mesquite to access various trailheads while safely parking their towing vehicles and trailers in a secure staging area.
- 8. Partnering and Leverage: The City of Mesquite is already partnering with the Kokopelli ATV Club on their grants by providing a place for the kiosk next to Flattop Mesa. The City Is a member of the Virgin River Coalition which is a group of government entities and citizens interested in the preservation and improvement of the Virgin River watershed. The City has supported this group by providing the input of numerous Mesquite City employees and meeting space for the group over the last three years. Numerous members of the BLM from Clark County in Nevada and Mohave County in Arizona* cooperatively participate in this group to find ways to protect and improve the environment of the watershed while facilitating all types of recreation including OHV. The Kokopelli ATV Club representatives and other community members such as the Friends of Gold Butte, etc. participate in this process. The leverage that the City of Mesquite can provide is significant in that the City will provide the land for these staging areas, the

manpower to clean and maintain them, and help build them. The staff and their equipment are already available. The City will also continue to make available opportunities for volunteers to help in the maintenance of these facilities and trails in and around Mesquite. The Kokopelli ATV Club would like to host the OHV Summit in Mesquite and provide various Poker Runs, Jamborees, and other OHV events that will attract visitors from Nevada and surrounding states in cooperation with the City and various Mesquite businesses.

*The participation of the BLM for Mohave County from the bordering state (Arizona) is particularly important, not only to the watershed of the Virgin River which comes out of Utah, but because many OHV rides out of Mesquite include partial rides into Mohave County to access other Nevada OHV areas south and north of Mesquite.

9. Economic Integration: Not only are local park and recreation professionals providing essential services and facilities to communities nationwide that enhance Conservation, Health & Wellness and Social Equity, but they are also powerful engines of economic

activity. Policymakers and elected officials at all levels of government should take notice. Investments made to local and regional parks not only raise the standard of living in our neighborhoods, towns and cities, but they also spark activity that can ripple throughout a state's economy.

In the State of Nevada alone in 2019, the Economic Activity in outdoor recreation for Transactions was \$1,321,280,720 and Labor Income was \$86,882,201 Employment in recreation in the state constituted 11,784 jobs. Nationally, recreation accounted for 166 billion in economic activity and 1.1 million jobs.

In our era of constantly evolving technology and smart devices, it's nice to know that the outdoor recreation industry is growing too, as more people are heading outside for leisure and adventure. A recent report by the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) on the outputs from outdoor recreation shows that outdoor recreation now accounts for 2.2 percent of the U.S. gross domestic product (GDP). The report states that more than \$734 billion is contributed by outdoor recreation to the total U.S. gross output. Amy Roberts, CEO of the organization Outdoor Industry Association (OIA), the leading trade association for the outdoor industry, said their analysis shows that Americans spend \$887 billion annually on outdoor recreation from camping, OHV, hiking and climbing and that all of this data underscores how outdoor recreation is a significant and growing contributor to the U.S. economy. "BEA's final numbers confirm what the outdoor industry has always known, that outdoor recreation truly is an economic force, accounting for over 2 percent of the entire nation's GDP and growing faster than the economy as a whole," Roberts said. "We strongly encourage members of Congress to invest in public lands as these numbers demonstrate the return on investment." Americans cherish their outdoor experiences, according to Jerry Stritzke, president and CEO of REI Co-op, and this unites us as a nation, as well as being good for the economy. "The government's data confirms what many of us in the industry have known for quite some time," he said. "Millions of Americans love to get outside and enjoy time with friends and family, adventuring right out their back doors or off into our iconic wild places." We will be looking at the NRPS, NRPA and LVCVA for additional funding or other grants to help with the facility and upgrades to tourism for the City of Mesquite.

The proposed Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) system in Mesquite, Nevada could be one of the best in Nevada as we are situated on the border of Arizona and Nevada on I-15. A variety of experiences and a large number of miles are available for 4-wheel driving, All Terrain Vehicles (ATV's), Recreational Off-Highway Vehicles (ROV's) and motorcycle use. The OHV system is comprised of designated routes and trails primarily in the Arizona Strip, Lincoln County, and Gold Butte NV. There are roads open to Sport Utility Vehicle and 4wheel drive vehicle travel while some roads are primarily 4x4 routes. The OHV system offers a wide range of experience levels including novice, intermediate, and expert levels and are rated and signed as easiest, more difficult, and most difficult.
- 11.Please provide justification for NEW facility/program development: restrooms, trails, signs, and other amenities: As mentioned earlier, Mesquite has no secured staging areas to offer OHV visitors. There are more than 30 million Americans riding OHV's per year and 7 percent of all visitors to Mesquite are engaging in OHV, motorized trail rides. As demand for OHV recreational opportunities continues to rise, visitors' use preferences become increasingly important, for example, cameras, lighted and fenced areas for staging vehicles, and restrooms. OHV recreation offers increasing value to local communities and local businesses in terms of economic impact. Preparing these areas will also help agency land managers to balance the needs for more motorized recreational opportunities for tourists with their economic benefits to communities while preventing adverse environmental effects. Each agency must continue implementing their current travel management policies which will include an economically viable, environmentally friendly and socially sustainable OHV staging area/transportation system.
