(1) The National Park Service (NPS) team representing Lake Mead National Recreation Area will provide additional labor to assist in leading the planning, coordination and delivery of the proposed scope of work. In particular, their Partnerships & Grants Representative will help oversee development and implementation of offroad enthusiast-focused surveys and communication plans as described in the attached scope of work. A NPS Park Ranger will also support in leading the events included throughout this project, such as the (2) educational trail ride events, (1) ride-and-clean volunteer project, and (12) outreach events. The value of this inkind labor has been estimated at \$20,000.00 for FY26 (July 2025 – June 2026). Furthermore, this project has been intentionally designed to scale into our recently awarded SNPLMA project with Lake Mead National Recreation Area (beginning in 2026). This structure will allow us to sustainably plan for long-term employment of the new part-time Offroad Outreach Coordinator position and Offroad Enthusiast Consultant that will be secured through this grant, with future SNPLMA funding being leveraged to provide funds for an additional two to three years of employment for these new roles beyond the initial year requested through this grant.

- (2) The team from the Nevada Outdoor School has agreed to cover their own labor and travel expenses to provide training to Get Outdoors Nevada team members and support with the delivery of our six (6) planned "Ride Safe, Ride Smart" Nevada OHV Certification Courses to be delivered throughout Clark County. We are both grateful that they are able to provide this as an inkind service to Get Outdoors Nevada through funding they have previously secured through the Nevada OHV program.
- (3) In December of 2024, Get Outdoors Nevada received a \$150,000.00 private foundation grant aimed at supporting our capacity to expand into new service areas and programs. We plan to leverage approximately \$15,000.00 of this funding to cover the administrative and management expenses associated with overseeing the development and delivery of this new area of programming for our organization.

Proposed Scope of Work

Since 2000, Get Outdoors Nevada (GON) has provided free and accessible environmental education and volunteer programs that have connected over 50,000 Nevadans to nature in the Clark County area. In examining our current program offerings alongside trends in how Nevadans are spending time outdoors, we have recognized a need to expand our programming to include more outreach, education and safety training targeted towards off-road enthusiasts – a user group that is rapidly growing in our community. The below proposed scope of work has been thoughtfully designed to build a sustainable framework for expanding our existing organizational outreach work into the OHV community in Southern Nevada by investing to attract OHV-specific talent to our team to better plan for and meet the needs of the off-road enthusiast community. Furthermore, this **one-year** scope of work has been designed to complement our recently awarded SNPLMA project which will be conducted in partnership with Lake Mead National Recreation Area beginning in 2026.

Offroad Enthusiast Focused Outreach

Starting in July and August of 2025, our GON Outreach and Communications team will work to develop a Community Outreach, Engagement, and Education (COEE) Implementation Plan focused on cultivating opportunities to engage with off-road enthusiasts in OHV-focused settings. Concurrently, our team will seek to hire a new part-time Off-road Outreach Coordinator position and an Off-road Enthusiast Consultant who will play key roles in the design and implementation of the COEE plan. Our goal is to attract talent that is already deeply rooted as off-road enthusiasts themselves, which will help establish the future success of this outreach program as we work to build genuine and sustainable connections with the OHV community.

Throughout the rest of our FY26 Programming Season (September 2025 – June 2026) our team will work to implement the Community Outreach, Engagement, and Education (COEE) Plan, which will consist of the following elements:

- (a) Outreach and/or tabling presence in at least twelve (12) OHV-focused events including both off-road back country formal events (e.g. Hump N' Bump and conferences related to off-roading and backcountry recreation) and presenting at local Southern Nevada clubs (e.g. off-road/target-community organization meetings or Meet-ups). Attendance at these events will share or advertise programming offerings, as well as solicit community input from off-road enthusiasts on desired recreational opportunities in two areas of the Lake Mead National Recreation Area (NRA), the Overton Arm and Government Wash. Community input and outreach will also consider current OHV use on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) lands immediately adjacent to Lake Mead NRA and the challenges users have with different land management agencies, land use, and management plans, along with the community's recreational goals.
- (b) Hiring an Off-road Enthusiast Consultant and dedicated Off-road Outreach Coordinator will position Get Outdoors Nevada to act as a liaison between the National Park Service (NPS), BLM and the OHV community to communicate each entity's goals, processes, limitations, and/or other considerations to enhance shared understanding, develop potential continuity between management plans of the different land management agencies, and better meet the recreational goals of offroad enthusiasts. Beginning in 2026 (and over the following 4-years), Lake Mead NRA will develop two new site-specific management plans (one for Government Wash and the other for the Overton Arm), to develop new recreational opportunities in light of lowering lake levels, while protecting cultural and natural resources. Lake Mead NRA received SNPLMA funding to support this plan development, as well as to implement components of the plan (e.g. creating new roads to reach the water or sites of interest, developing new backcountry camping areas and/or trails, blocking off illegal roads that are dangerous/lead to nowhere/damage resources, etc.). Get Outdoors Nevada, through the part-time position and consulting via this proposal, intends to create and support

- communication pathways to help elevate the OHV community's voice in Lake Mead's new planning, while also enhancing the community's understanding of federal processes and laws. This is a unique and important opportunity to help ensure in-depth community input targeted towards off-road enthusiasts.
- (c) Developing and implementing up to two (2) educational trail rides within the Lake Mead National Recreation Area or on bordering public lands in partnership with the National Park Service (NPS) and local off-road clubs and off-road leaders. The goal of these trail rides is to create a space for positive interactions between NPS team members and offroad enthusiasts while providing hands-on recreational learning that explores relevant topics (such as "don't bust the crust," protecting cultural and natural resources including specific endangered plants and animals in the Project Area, managing public lands, and differences between the types of public land) in an environment and context that is meaningful and engaging.
- (d) Planning and delivering one (1) large-scale volunteer project that engages the off-road community in a communal "ride-and-clean" event where there will be opportunities to ride between different "cleaning stations" (in an engaging "poker ride" type of format) to participate in trail and/or habitat maintenance. This volunteer project will be designed to support cleanup and restoration of the Government Wash area, which has been damaged by illegal OHV usage. This project will be intentionally designed to develop cross-collaboration between GON's existing base of outdoor enthusiasts and cultivate new off-road enthusiasts, with the aim of exposing non-OHV-users to an opportunity to experience and "ride along" on a new form of outdoor recreation all while connecting with our local landscape and giving back through service.
- (e) Develop social media campaigns (e.g. Instagram, Facebook, and/or other social media platforms) and GON Newsletter content that highlights the above events while also providing specific messaging related to off-road safety, legal OHV access, community clubs, events or resources, natural and cultural resource protection, and opportunities for community input in relation to the development of recreational access plans for two upcoming project areas in Lake Mead National Recreation Area (Government Wash and Overton Arm). Social media campaign materials will also be shared with the Lake Mead National Recreation Area, should they wish to post of share them with their audience.

Off-road Safety Education Geared Towards Youth (15 and under)

Our Get Outdoors Nevada (GON) staff includes an Education Team with five environmental education professionals who delivered programming to over 10,000 Clark County students in the 2023-2024 school year. Our Education Team will partner with Nevada Outdoor School to expand their successful "Ride Safe, Ride Smart" Nevada OHV Safety Certification Program into Clark County. The team from Nevada Outdoor School will collaborate closely to provide training, assessment and resources to our GON Education Team members as an in-kind contribution to our program, creating a win-win

in which we are able to help expand the success and capacity of their program into Southern Nevada while upskilling our own team members in a new and urgent focus area for outdoor safety training.

Throughout our FY26 Programming Season (September 2025 – June 2026) we anticipate the following scope of work in connection with Safety Education Training for Youth:

- (a) Deliver up to six (6) in-person "Ride Safe, Ride Smart" Nevada OHV Certification Courses throughout Clark County with focus on providing services to both the Greater Las Vegas Valley as well as communities in Logandale, Moapa and Laughlin. Each certification course will include a hands-on rider skills challenge and evaluation through which youth participants will be supported through safety evaluation that includes: assessment of their planned usage vehicle to ensure appropriate size and fit, evaluation of their skills and handling, further hands-on training and coaching prior to achieving certification if warranted.
- (b) Distribute coupons for free access to the Off-road ED Nevada Course in partnership with the Nevada Outdoor School. This online training course will provide an important new off-road-focused learning resource that will be incorporated into our annual environmental education outreach efforts, through which we currently partner with over 45 Clark County school sites each school year. Participants in the above-mentioned Certification Courses will also first complete this online training course prior to participating in our in-person certification assessment course.
- (c) All of the above youth-focused safety and education offerings will be featured in our quarterly educator's newsletter, The Flow, which is currently distributed to over one thousand Clark County educators.

Project Deliverables

Community Outreach & Education Deliverables:

- One (1) new team member hired as Get Outdoors Nevada's first "Off-road Outreach Coordinator," attracting talent with deep roots in the offroad community.
- 2. Direct engagement with at least 1,000 off-road enthusiasts through twelve (12) outreach and tabling events in both off-road back country formal events and presenting at relevant clubs.
- **3. Up to 250 off-road enthusiasts** complete a survey soliciting their feedback into the development of recreational access plans for two upcoming project areas in

- Lake Mead National Recreation Area (Government Wash and Overton Arm) so that their input can inform National Park Service planning.
- **4.** At least **50** off-road enthusiasts participate in our three events around the Lake Mead National Recreation area, including two (2) educational rides and one (1) volunteer event.
- **5.** Up to **500 pounds (lbs.) of waste** recovered from the Government Wash area in Lake Mead National Recreation Area, mitigating damage from illegal OHV usage.
- 6. Up to **60 youth (15 and under) participate** in up to six (6) "Ride Safe, Ride Smart" Nevada OHV Certification Courses delivered in Clark County.
- 7. Three (3) Get Outdoors Nevada Education Team Members are trained by the staff from Nevada Outdoor School in delivering "Ride Safe, Ride Smart" certification courses to youth.
- 8. Up to **100** youth and adults participate in the free online Nevada Off-road ED Safety Course via coupons distributed at Get Outdoors Nevada events and tabling.
- 9. At least **30 unique** social media and newsletter content posts are developed, resulting in at least **3,000+ impressions** on Get Outdoors Nevada social media channels and newsletter. (Our current audience size includes over 10,000 monthly newsletter subscribers, 6,500+ Instagram followers and 5,900+ Facebook followers). Social media and newsletter content will also be shared with Lake Mead NRA, which may expand the reach if they choose to share it with their audience.

Priorities and Scoring Narrative

Law Enforcement Strategy that addresses registration enforcement, including Public Education & Outreach aimed at increasing renewals and new registrations: How will your project increase the number of OHV registrations in the district. How will the equipment and time be used to increase OHV safety and awareness? Please reference the Law Enforcement Statistics reporting form.

To increase the number of OHV registrations in Clark County, our project will focus on cultivating genuine connections with offroad enthusiasts and fostering educational engagement between the off-road enthusiast community and land management agencies such as the National Park Service (NPS) and Bureau of Land Management (BLM). Through our extensive outreach efforts, we aim to increase awareness around safe and legal recreational activity, ultimately encouraging more individuals to register their OHVs. Key components of our strategy include:

- 1. **Community Outreach and Engagement –** Throughout the twelve (12) outreach/tabling events that we host or attend, we plan to provide literature and/or educational materials that highlight Nevada Revised Statue (NRS) 490 and 484. We will also provide opportunities for off road enthusiasts to interact directly with NPS Park Rangers that will provide information to mitigate the challenges users have with different land management agencies, land use, and management plans, while developing a deeper understanding of the community's recreational goals.
- 2. Community-Agency Liaison By working with local off-roading clubs and leaders, while also partnering closely with federal land management agencies such as the National Park Service (NPS) and Bureau of Land Management (BLM), we will serve as a community liaison that provides a platform for off-road enthusiasts to express their needs, while staying informed about recreational plans, developing a better understanding of the federal land management process, and learning about the importance of observing legal off-road access.
- 3. **Experiential Educational Initiatives -** Through the two (2) educational trail rides and one (1) large-scale volunteer event, we will provide opportunities for off-road enthusiasts to engage with NPS and BLM staff through hands-on recreational learning that explores relevant topics in OHV safety, promoting responsible riding while enhancing community awareness around public lands

- management challenges. These activities will also help participants understand the legal requirements and benefits of OHV registration and/or permitting.
- 4. **Social Media and Public Outreach -** We will launch targeted social media campaigns and utilize our newsletter to spread information about OHV safety, legal access, and community events designed specifically to provide information and resources geared towards new and beginner off road users who may most benefit from information related to registration and permitting. These platforms will raise awareness about the importance of registering OHVs, ensuring that more riders are informed about how to properly register and maintain their vehicles.

Planning, Environmental Studies, Conservation: Describe how the environmental studies, conservation and/or planning will mitigate resources impacted by OHV recreation. How will your project contribute to the conservation of our natural resources, while enhancing OHV opportunities?

Our project has been designed to build a meaningful connection between offroad enthusiasts and land management agencies like NPS and BLM, to ensure conservation of natural resources while also enhancing future off-road recreation opportunities. Input from off-road enthusiasts will be incorporated into the development of two new site-specific management plans at Lake Mead National Recreation Area (one for Government Wash and the other for the Overton Arm), as the NPS team works to develop new recreational opportunities in light of lowering lake levels, while protecting cultural and natural resources.

Our programming will further engage the offroad enthusiast community in hands-on activities such as educational trail rides, a volunteer clean-up event, and outreach at OHV-focused gatherings, all aimed at fostering positive interactions with agency staff while educating to reduce the negative environmental impact of illegal or irresponsible OHV use. Through our large-scale volunteer project in specific, we will engage offroad enthusiasts in supporting the restoration of damaged areas in Government Wash, while further educating participants about the importance of protecting cultural and natural resources, and advocating for sustainable outdoor recreation practices.

As we work with the Nevada Outdoor School to implement their youth-focused safety education programming in Southern Nevada, including the "Ride Safe, Ride Smart" program, we will ensure that our existing environmental education principles based in "Leave No Trace" and "don't bust the crust" are included to instill responsible behavior in future riders, promoting safe off-road use while shaping the next generation of responsible stewards for Nevada's public lands.

Enhancement or Maintenance of existing trails and facilities: How will maintenance needs be prioritized and how often will your project hold a maintenance/ trails enhancement event? HOW will your project be maintained and WHO has committed to the ongoing maintenance of the facility or trail (note: a minimum of 2 maintenance/ trail events are required per year).

While enhancement or maintenance of existing trails and facilities is not a focus for this grant request, input from off-road enthusiasts will be gathered and incorporated into the development of two new site-specific management plans at Lake Mead National Recreation Area (one for Government Wash and the other for the Overton Arm), with the aim of providing a unique and important opportunity to help ensure indepth community input targeted towards off-road enthusiasts. Get Outdoors Nevada hopes to establish ongoing communication pathways that help elevate the OHV community's voice in Lake Mead's new planning, while also enhancing the community's understanding of federal processes and laws, with the intention that this will enhance future trail development.

Also, our large-scale volunteer project will be intentionally designed to target the Government Wash area of Lake Mead National Recreation Area and address impacts and damage created by illegal OHV usage. We will use this as an educational opportunity to explore topics related to "don't bust the crust," protecting cultural and natural resources - including specific endangered plants and animals in the Project Area, managing public lands, and differences between the types of public land, while also providing a recreational environment and context that is both meaningful and engaging.

Training: Please describe the goals and objectives of your public safety training program. Is it a nationally recognized certification? What sets your safety training program apart from the others?

We will work in partnership with Nevada Outdoor School (NOS) to expand their already successful "Ride Safe, Ride Smart" program into Clark County through delivering six (6) in-person Nevada OHV Safety Certification Courses. We are honored to have the opportunity to partner to expand their already successful program, rather than duplicating efforts by designing a separate program, and have been impressed by the quality of their programming, designed in collaboration with the Nevada Off-Highway Vehicles Program, Nevada State Parks – Recreational Trails Program, Bureau of Land Management, Nevada Off Road Association (NVORA), Tread Lightly!, University Medical Center and Renown Pediatric Injury Prevention Program. We are grateful for their interest in taking time to train our GON Education Team members in delivering their youth rider evaluations and OHV safety trainings so that we can upskill our own workforce and collaborate to expand services beyond the scope of what either of our organizations would be able to achieve individually.

The "Ride Safe, Ride Smart" programming delivered in Southern Nevada will follow the same three-stage layout employed by the Nevada Outdoor School including: (1) an online OHV certification course, (2) inperson youth rider evaluations, and (3) OHV safety trainings for riders who need more support to successfully achieve certification through the evaluation process. This multi-touchpoint approach will ensure a meaningful educational and evaluative process is delivered, through which OHV users aged 15 and under will learn about safety, Tread Lightly! principles, and responsible off-roading practices that will help to shape a future generation of outdoor recreationalists who are responsible stewards of Nevada's public lands.

Connectivity/Loops: How will the project impact connectivity of OHV trails, facilities, and local communities? Please include maps of areas impacted by your project and describe those impacts.

While this project hasn't been designed to address physical trail connectivity and facilities as part of the primary scope of work, we are seeking to build the foundation for greater collaboration and connectivity among various stakeholders in Southern Nevada. Specifically, through hiring an Off-road Enthusiast Consultant and dedicated Off-road Outreach Coordinator, we are working to position Get Outdoors Nevada as a liaison between the National Park Service (NPS), BLM and the OHV community to communicate each entity's goals, processes, limitations, and/or other considerations to enhance shared understanding, develop potential continuity between management plans of the different land management agencies, and better meet the recreational goals of offroad enthusiasts. Get Outdoors Nevada is further positioned to act in this capacity through our role as the official "friends group" for Lake Mead National Recreation Area. We intend to create and support communication pathways that will help elevate the OHV community's voice in Lake Mead's new planning, leading to connectivity that meets the desires of recreationists.

While the project will not include any OHV trail development at this current stage, a key component of the proposed scope of work will be to actively solicit and incorporate community input from offroad enthusiasts on desired recreational opportunities in the Overton Arm and Government Wash areas of Lake Mead National Recreation Area (NRA) as the National Park Service (NPS) works to develop new site-specific management plans for these park areas. By engaging directly with the off-road enthusiast community, we will help gather valuable feedback from this user group that may be valuable for determining future trail preferences, opportunities to improve connectivity, and address concerns related to current and future OHV use in these areas. Our aim is to engage off-road enthusiasts in the planning of future OHV trails in these areas, ensuring that recreational opportunities are aligned with community needs while fostering better connectivity between the public and various land management agencies. Through these efforts, we hope to lay the foundation for an integrated and sustainable OHV trail network that meets the needs of offroad enthusiasts and supports responsible land use.

This project has been planned in close partnership with both the National Park Service team at Lake Mead National Recreation Area and with another Nevada non-profit that is already specializing in OHV safety training and education, the Nevada Outdoor School. Furthermore, we have already identified a highly qualified off-road community leader, Ashley Lee, to serve as the Offroad Enthusiast Consultant in shaping the implementation of this project. With 25 years of experience in Southern Nevada, and successful completion of past projects with local agencies and governments including U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, Bureau of Land Management, Clark County, City of Las Vegas and City of North Las Vegas, Get Outdoors Nevada is well positioned to act as a community liaison that connects conversation and conducts programming linking the general public and outdoor enthusiasts with local stakeholders. Through our status as the official "friends group" of Lake Mead National Recreation Area, we are well positioned to work collaboratively with National Park Service team members to plan and deliver outreach and education activities that connect the park with off-road enthusiasts.

Economic Integration: How will this project improve OHV recreation opportunities that help local, regional, or state economies grow?

Input solicited from off-road enthusiasts will be incorporated as Lake Mead NRA works to develop two new site-specific management plans (one for Government Wash and the other for the Overton Arm). In doing so, we aim to support the park in expanding recreation opportunities in light of lowering lake levels. We

hope that this will provide benefits to retailers and other local businesses that will benefit from increased patronage from off-road enthusiasts who will recreate on these sites. Lake Mead NRA has recently received SNPLMA funding to support this future plan development, as well as to implement components of the plan through creating new roads to reach the water or sites of interest and developing new backcountry camping areas and/or trails.






Illegal Roads at Government Wash Project and Active Mgmt Areas




Illegal Roads Across the Park (Large Overview)
