How will the equipment and time be used to increase OHV safety and awareness? Please reference the Law Enforcement Statistics reporting form.

The equipment requested, a Ranger and applicable EMS Response equipment, is OHV safety and awareness at the highest level as this equipment will literally respond and save lives. Everywhere this equipment is seen, it reminds people to be safe and aware. The Moapa Valley Fire District (MVFD) is incredibly active at all PR and outreach events locally, such as the Clark County Fair, and they hold many outreach events of their own such as the May Day Bowler Elementary Student and Family Community Outreach Event held every year before the school's May Day Celebration. Their equipment and their volunteers are constantly promoting OHV safety, overall safety in the desert, and awareness while recreating. They commit to holding two OHV Safety Classes for the first two years including a rider safety component, discussing what to do before people go OHV riding, what safety gear is needed, and the importance of staying hydrated in the desert. The MVFD also committed to holding two First Aid and CPR classes and two EMS roving patrol during Nevada OHV Program approved activities. During all of their outreach events they will educate the public about safety and promote the OHV program by focusing attention on the value, need, and necessity of the equipment the OHV program funded.

The MVFD. also attends National Public Land Day events at Logandale Trails as well as other clean-up events at the trails; providing education, awareness, and actual EMS response if any participants have an accident.

The MVFD averages 75 EMS responses calls a year; 40 of those calls are at Logandale Trails (See attached map of location of calls). These EMS calls are specifically for OHV users and not other recreation groups. Each call costs the Moapa Valley Fire District and

Clark County a minimum of \$900 for operational expenses. While this is not listed as a match, it should be because each year those expenses are between \$22,000 and \$30,000.

The BLM is currently short-staffed with LE rangers. The local ranger retired, and the position has been rehired; however, the ranger lives in Las Vegas which makes his response to any emergency extremely delayed.

2. Enhancement or Maintenance of existing trails and facilities: How will maintenance needs be prioritized and how often will your project hold a maintenance/trails enhancement event? Training has two major components regarding the Moapa Valley Fire District (MVFD), with both being very applicable to this grant proposal.

First, training of the volunteers--literally a match for this grant, but not listed in the budget because this training is relevant to all the volunteers do---not just exclusively for EMS response they are requesting equipment for. Nevertheless, this training is of great value. The rural fire district spent \$42,000 to train 25 volunteer EMT/fire fighters to be certified as EMT-Basic. They also commit to send their volunteer EMTs/fire fighters to classes involving OHV training. Every EMT is required to do 40 hours of continued education every two years and currently approximately 30 fire fighters are certified EMTs.

The other component of training involves the MVFD committing to holding two OHV safety, two First Aid/CPR classes a year in Logandale for the first two years. They will promote, schedule, organize, facilitate, and administer these safety and first aid classes.

This grant has nothing to do with trail mapping and signage, BUT more maps and signage would provide recreationalists with more information, thus resulting in injuries/accidents.

When people need help, they start to worry; when they start to worry, they start to make poor decisions. One of those decisions is that they try to find their way 'back' to cell phone range or to camp and often do that driving cross country. In sensitive areas, which most of Clark County is sensitive and/or protected habitat of the desert tortoise, driving cross country can be VERY harmful. When damage to the habitat happens, it is quite possible for access restrictions to happen. Additionally, if a member of a party is hurt, others become stressed and can make poor decisions also---trying to find the 'quickest way to get help' which can result in driving cross country and creating damage to the habitat and tortoise ecosystem. Better search and rescue equipment can get to people faster, thus cutting down on the time that may be spent trying to get unlost or trying to get help.

8. Partnering and Leverage: Who else is involved in this project? Please describe outreach with stakeholders, partners and local governments, that you have communicated with in planning this project.

The partnership between Clark County, Moapa Valley Fire District, Valley of Fire State Park, Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department and other governmental entities is important to provide a stress-free, enjoyable experience for those that enjoy and recreate on public lands. These entities already work together and with the public regarding important regulations; it is important to note this coordination and the benefits to the public that already occur and to state that this important coordination will continue to occur, ultimately benefiting all recreationalists and certainly OHV users.

9. Economic Integration: How will this project improve OHV recreation opportunities that help local, regional, or state economies grow?

Economic Integration and economic benefits that OHV use brings to the local Moapa Valley area can be greatly reduced if Logandale Trails and/or the adjacent public lands are unsafe, people continue to get injured, and negative attention is focused on these unfortunate incidents. Providing the best OHV safety and first aid training and EMS response possible will help reinforce positive messaging that this is a safe area, but if you have an accident, volunteers are well trained and have the best equipment to get you to safety asap; to that end, the funding of this grant is important and will assist in providing EMS response when needed and providing preventative safety training.
