Type here: The Mesquite Police Department will provide education and enforcement of laws involving the registration and operation of off-highway vehicles (OHV) in Mesquite and surrounding areas of NE Clark County. There will be search and rescue of stranded, injured and lost OHV operators within the Mesquite Police Department's jurisdiction or through request of mutual aid.

The Vehicle identification number (VIN) inspection/registration events will be conducted by officers who will stage to conduct OHV VIN inspections for off-highway vehicle owners.

There will be proactive enforcement of OHV registration violations in the Mesquite and Bunkerville areas. Offenders will be stopped, cited, and given a complete VIN inspection at the time of the patrol stop, along with other necessary documentation to complete the registration process.

- 1) Advertise in local publications that OHV VIN inspections are available to both residents and non-residents at the Mesquite Police Department every Monday and Wednesday between 8 a.m. and Noon.
- 1) Conduct at a minimum of six public VIN inspection events in Mesquite per calendar year. Registration fees and forms will be collected and mailed to DMY by police department personnel.
- 4) Conduct a minimum of 15 OHV patrol days in the Mesquite and Bunkerville area during the peak OHV recreation times of September through November and February through May.
- a) Educate the public through consensual and non-consensual police contacts with the project area.
- b) Provide literature and/or education to the public regarding Nevada Revised Statue (NRS) 490 and 484.
- c) Cite operators of unregistered OHVs, as well as, conduct VIN inspection during the stop in order to assist the owner so he/she may complete the OHV registration process.
- d) Record all probable cause OHV stops via citation or warning citation to assist in the grant tracking compliance of OHV owners and operators in regards to registration and moving violations. This will be accomplished via the current computer-aided dispatch (CAD) reporting systems and through manual tracking by the Mesquite Police Department training officer.

- 1. Law Enforcement Strategy that addresses registration enforcement, including Public Education & Outreach aimed at increasing renewals and new registrations:

It is the goal of the Mesquite Police Department (MPD) to use grant funds to make the use of OHV's within the city limits and outlying areas safe and enjoyable for both residents and visitors through public education and enforcement of OHV registration requirements.

Located in Northeast Clark County, on the border of Arizona and a short 30 minute drive from St. George Utah, the City of Mesquite is a destination for OHV enthusiasts. An OHV friendly city, Mesquite permits the operation of Off Highway Vehicles on city streets.

The Mesquite Police Department and offers OHV VIN inspections to residents and out of state visitors on a set two day a week schedule. The MPD Records Division staff is familiar with OHV registration requirements, city code as it applies to OHV use, and OHV titling information. The Records staff provides all necessary forms required to register an OHV and will mail in completed registration forms for the applicants.

The MPD is requesting funding to continue to advertise the weekly OHV Vin Inspection program, offsite registration events and OHV registration patrol.

During patrol events officers will make contact with OHV drivers on city streets and outlying areas. The officers will place a primary focus on locating and citing impaired drivers in an effort to keep other OHV enthusiasts safe and not to damper the reputation of the OHV rider community. The secondary focus will be on the compliance of OHV registration and sharing information on the safe operation on OHV on trails and roadways.

The MPD has previously hosted successful VIN Registration events with the OHV grant absorbing the cost of officer overtime. The MPD will host six VIN Registration events over the spring and fall months during the grant period. Paid advertising will be used in conjunction with posters and social media to alert the public to the events.

Registrants will be encouraged to bring a personal check to the event and all necessary paperwork will be provided. In order to expedite OHV registration, the MPD will collect the checks and the paperwork from the event and mail them to the DMV in Carson City. The events will be advertised within the NE Clark County region and will be designed to attract residents of Mesquite, Moapa Valley as well as residents of Beaver Dam, Littlefield and Scenic Arizona who frequent Nevada in their OHV.

While the MPD is not able to estimate grant match at this time, data will be collected and submitted to the Grantor for use in their reporting.

- 2. The operator of an OHV inside the City of Mesquite is required to be 16 years of age or older and possess a valid motor vehicle operators license. MMC 6-7-3, NRS 490.110.1.
- Traffic Laws Applicable: To the fullest extent practicable, the traffic laws of the state of Nevada, and of the City of Mesquite municipal code are applicable to the operation of OHVs on any designated public streets, roads, and/or highways of the city. NRS 490.130, MMC 6-7-5-G
- 4. OHV shall only be used and operated within the city of Mesquite over such public streets, roads, or highways that are designated by resolution of the city council as open to such OHV use and operation. MMC 6-7-6-A. Mesquite Boulevard, Sandhill Boulevard, Pioneer Boulevard from Oasis Boulevard to Sandhill Boulevard, Falcon Ridge Boulevard from Pioneer Boulevard to Mesquite Boulevard are closed to OHV traffic.
- 5. No person may operate an OHV on a designated public street, road, or highway for any purpose other than to travel to or from a private or public area that is open for use by OHV. Use of an OHV for general transportation is prohibited. MMC 6-7-3-E
- 6. Parent/Adult Responsibility: In addition to any juvenile culpability which may be imposed due to violations of Mesquite municipal code, the responsibility for complying with the provisions of Mesquite municipal code shall rest upon the adult owner or custodian of any OHV or the head of household where any OHV is kept, whether or not ownership of the OHV is claimed by any other person residing in said household. A husband or wife, or two (2) or more adults living together, may jointly or separately be charged as heads of the household where an OHV is kept. MMC 6-7-7-A.




OFF HIGHWAY VEHICLE OPERATION INSIDE THE CITY OF MESQUITE

The State of Nevada and City of Mesquite has established guidelines to allow OHV operators access to areas open for OHV use. Use of an OHV for general transportation or travel for purpose other than access to recreational areas is prohibited.

An Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) is a motor vehicle that is designed primarily for off-highway and all-terrain use. All OHV operated in Nevada are required to be registered, unless exempt by NRS 490.082.3. A person may operate a registered off-highway vehicle on any public land, trail, way or unpaved county road <u>unless</u> prohibited by the governmental entity which has jurisdiction over the public land, trail, way or unpaved county road.

All OHV operated by government agencies or operated for work conducted by or at the direction of a public or private utility are exempt from registration. NRS 490.082.

Operation of OHV inside the City of Mesquite is limited to use set in Mesquite Municipal Code (MMC) 6-7-6. " OHV shall be used and operated within the city of Mesquite only over such public streets, roads, or highways that are designated by resolution of the city council as open to such OHV use and operation. All streets, roads, or highways that are not open for OHV use in the city of Mesquite shall be posted with signs indicating that OHV use is not permitted."
