Type here: First, with over 3,800 square miles of land within Mineral County, there is a great amount of dirt roads and OHV trails. Mineral County Public works is working to map and calculate how many miles of trails are in Mineral County. Mineral County has had a significant reduction in its budget over the past 15 years (i.e. approximately 50% reduction for Public works) Mineral County Public works is requesting assistance in purchasing a new Cat Model: 304E2 C Mini-Excavator and a Heavy Duty trailer for towing. In addition we would like to request the assistance of paying a Mineral County Public Works operator approximately 240 hours of pay to accomplish trail maintenance when areas are identified for repair. Our hopes are to identify areas that need repairs and over the next 12 months use the equipment and man hours to make the necessary repairs. Mineral County will be responsible for all equipment maintenance and storage.

This project will provide funds to support the OHV trails within Mineral County. It will make the trails throughout Mineral County safer for OHV enthusiasts but also Mineral County Sheriff's Office. Mineral County plays a large part in different off-road events that take place within the County. We support the OHV community in providing Search and Rescue to help plan events and also monitor and assist in OHV events. During planned events Mineral County Sheriff's Office hands out brochures promoting OHV registration and safe operations. Mineral County Sheriff's Office also patrols Mineral County Trials to enforce all applicable laws.

2. Enhancement or Maintenance of existing trails and facilities: Describe the maintenance intervals for your project. How will maintenance needs be prioritized and how often will your project hold a maintenance/trails enhancement event? HOW will your project be maintained and WHO has committed to the ongoing maintenance of the facility or trail. (note: a minimum of 2 maintenance/trail events are required per year)

Mineral County Search and Rescue will develop a list of trails in need of repair. This list will be provided to Mineral County Public Works to prioritize. Mineral County Public Works will then be responsible for completing the repairs to the OHV trails. Mineral County Public Works has agreed to complete a minimum of 240 man hours of work on Mineral County trails. Any repairs above and beyond will be paid for by Mineral County.

3. Training: Please describe the goals and objectives of your public training program, i.e., Public Education, Rider Classes, Safety, Trail Building, or Outdoor Ethics. Number of people trained, contacts made, etc.

Mineral County Sheriff's Office goals are to be 100% compliant in OHV registration. During large events Mineral County Deputies hand out educational brochures to all OHV operators and passengers. During events where our Mineral County Search and Rescue are present, they support safe riding and provide education on the trails to subjects who are riding recklessly or improperly.

4. Trail mapping and signing of existing trails and facilities: If a mapping component is included in the grant, please describe how it will be integrated with the current web mapping application found on OHV.NV.GOV

This project does not have a mapping component.

One of our current projects for OHV trails is recreating the Bodie Canyon Road. The road was washed out approximately two years ago by a flash flood. By putting this road/trail back in service it will open up the trail system to Bodie State Park from Mineral County.

With the purchase of the Mini-Excavator we will be able to address flooding issues by placing culverts in flood prone areas. We can also change and enhance the natural flow of water across the roadways. This will help keep our trails from washing out by water.

Mineral County does not have the budget or the equipment required to maintain OHV trails in Mineral County. Without this grant, projects will not be able to happen. This would have a significant effect in a negative light by closing OHV trails in Mineral County.

The Mineral County Sheriff's Office has coordinated with the Mineral County Search and Rescue and Mineral County Public Works Department in locating and identifying trails and public access roads that are in need of repair. Once this program is implemented, we will advise the public to contact one of the above agencies if a trail or road is in need of repair

Dear Mr. Ferguson,

I am writing this letter to show that the Mineral County Search and Rescue supports the recent grant proposal being submitted to the Nevada OHV Commission, by the Mineral County Sheriff's Office, Mineral County Nevada. The County manages hundreds of miles, both motorized, and non-motorized, roads and trails throughout Mineral County. Receiving this funding would provide the county with greater ability to obtain much needed equipment and personnel; which would in turn offer needed assistance in the maintenance of these important resources.

The Mineral County Search and Rescue, on a regular schedule, travels the back roads of Mineral County for familiarization; whereas they are ready to assist visitors and locals that traverse our remote area of our county. Since we border California, we routinely experience "explorers" who are unfamiliar with our area and in turn find themselves in trouble. That's where we step in to assist them to safety. This a familiar scenario year round.

Together this would allow the continuation of safe outstanding outdoor recreational opportunities to the public and the economic benefits to the local communities that these types of opportunities provide.
