Nevada Outdoor School's Outdoor Ethics Education Program has been successfully spreading the message of safe and responsible recreation throughout our community and state over the past several years and our efforts continue to grow. We are especially effective in working with the younger generation providing engaging and inspiring outdoor experiences that grow children's appreciation of and connection to the natural world. Nevada Outdoor School uses only existing OHV trails and existing OHV recreation areas for our safety trainings. We also have a strong history of effective and successful management of many federal and non-federal funding sources including many Nevada Division of State Parks Recreational Trails Program grants, annual Bureau of Land Management Assistance Agreements and USDA Forest Service projects.

We have strong and continuing partnerships with the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office, the Northern Nevada ATV Association, the ATV Safety Institute, Oregon ATV Safety Programs and the Recreational Off Highway Vehicle Association to offer various ATV/OHV and Dirt Bike Safety trainings and certifications throughout the state. We plan on continuing to reach out our rural and urban communities to offer OHV Registration and VIN inspection events in partnership with other Sheriff's Offices across the state just like we already do in Humboldt County but continued support from the OHV Commission is essential in growing these events and programs.

Type here: Nevada Outdoor School (NOS) is committed to spreading the message of responsible recreation to people of all ages across Nevada through Tread Lightly! and OHV safety outreach and education. As the premier provider of outdoor ethics education in rural Nevada, we pride ourselves on our multi-faceted, effective and professional Outdoor Ethics Program including Front County (classroom lessons and activities), Back Country (eco and summer camps), Road Shows (our mobile education and outreach booth which travels around the state reaching thousands of Nevadans with the message of responsible recreation), Trainings (LNT and TL! Trainer and Awareness Courses; ATV, OHV and dirt bike safety trainings) and new this year our Outdoor Ethics Club (an outdoor recreation and stewardship club for junior high (7 & 8th grade) and high school (9th – 12th grade) students in Winnemucca). NOS's main goal with this program is to create a safe and responsible recreation ethic amongst all OHV enthusiasts in Nevada. We will accomplish this goal by working with at least 200 youth in school and after-school settings during the school year, running three ATV/Dirt Bike Rider Camps and at least seven outdoor adventure camps and excursions throughout the summer, attending at least six public outreach Road Shows throughout the year, co-hosting at least four registration/VIN inspection events with local Sheriff's offices during the spring and fall months, hosting at least 3 youth and 5 adult ATV/OHV/Dirt Bike safety trainings and hosting at least 3 Tread Lightly! Trainer Courses throughout the year. In addition to Tread Lightly!, Leave No Trace and ATV Safety curriculum, NOS will develop new interpretive material and add content to our educational outreach regarding the OHV registration law in Nevada and the user benefits of registering. In total, NOS plans to directly contact 400 people with that message. Additional contacts will be made through web presence and social media. As part of this program, we will be traveling to many locations throughout the state of Nevada and therefore will need reliable transportation in the form of a new vehicle. This vehicle will be housed at the Nevada Outdoor School Winnemucca office and regularly maintained by local, licensed mechanics to ensure top performance and longevity.

Some of our Road Show events also include co-hosting OHV registration and VIN inspection drives with our local Sheriff’s department. With increased funding, NOS hopes to coordinate with other Sheriff’s Offices across rural northern Nevada to</p>
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		co-host the same type of events resulting in increased outreach and education about OHV registration and an increased number of people actually getting VIN inspections and their OHVs registered in Nevada.

This will be done with the help of local youth through our Outdoor Ethics Club.

(TL!)’s messages states, “Respected Access is Open Access.” Nevada Outdoor School (NOS) wholeheartedly agrees with this message and works hard through our Outdoor Ethics program to educate the public about responsible recreation so our public lands stay healthy and open for everyone to enjoy. Irresponsible recreation, including harm done by OHV users, causes a variety of impacts to the natural world and recreation areas. These impacts lead to the necessity for increased maintenance and law enforcement. Unfortunately, lack of funding and resources to provide maintenance and law enforcement typically leads to riding and recreation areas being closed or access being limited. At NOS, we want public lands to stay open for generation to come. In order to accomplish this, we educate people about safe and responsible riding through our summer camps, trainings, school programs and Road Shows.

Our professional and effective outdoor ethics program is supported by outdoor enthusiast clubs such as the Nevada Muley's, Nevada Chukar Foundation, Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and Nevada Bighorn Unlimited. Additionally, NOS has maintained a financial assistance agreement with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) – Winnemucca District for the past 14 years to provide educational and interpretive programs, including outdoor ethics throughout the district. NOS also has a Challenge Cost Share Agreement with the BLM NV State Office to provide outdoor ethics programming and utilize BLM managed lands for ATV/OHV and dirt bike safety courses throughout the state. NOS's Outdoor Ethics program is also supported through funding by the Nevada State Park's Recreational Trails Program (RTP). However, most of our programs are very youth focused, including our front country, back county and Outdoor Ethics Club. Through these programs, we enable the younger population of Nevada to explore public lands in ways they may otherwise not have available to them through field trips and summer camps, ATV/Dirt bike trainings and other recreational and stewardship opportunities. While enjoying the outdoors, children directly see the value of safe and responsible outdoor recreation. These outdoor ethics programs directly impact the value the next generation of land users place on keeping recreation areas safe, open and pristine. Outdoor recreation including OHV riding is an important part of our culture in Nevada and NOS has been able to establish much of our community support from the fact that parents want their children to enjoy the same</p>

		opportunities for outdoor pursuits that they have had.

It could result in need for more law enforcement, more facility and trail maintenance, fire-fighting, campground restoration and more. Many times lack of funding for such needs results in public lands and recreation facilities being closed. Through outdoor ethics outreach and education, Nevada Outdoor School (NOS) spreads the message of responsible recreation and teaches people about the consequences of positive and negative interactions with the natural world. With more of our community being educated about outdoor ethics and responsibly recreating on our public lands, it decreases the need for law enforcement, facility maintenance, restoration work, etc. therefore, improving the economic vitality of our communities throughout Nevada.
