Reno Area Dirtriders ("RAD") seeks to continue its community outreach efforts, strengthen partnerships with land managers, and provide further support and education of the OHV Commission and grant program in 2021 as follows:

Community/Trailhead Clean-Ups

Conduct two (2) major clean-up efforts to address the blight of illegal dumping which occurs at various OHV trailheads on both BLM and USFS lands. Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful has agreed to supply one (1) dumpster per clean-up.

Separate and in addition to the active clean-ups, RAD would supply a dumpster for placement at Moonrocks (Bureau of Land Management – Sierra Front) during Memorial Day and Labor Day weekends, when the area is most heavily utilized by the public, in an effort to proactively reduce the trash left in the desert.

OHV Registration Drives

RAD will conduct quarterly (4) events to promote OHV registration and provide education, assistance and facilitation of the registration process to individual users. Notwithstanding the events, RAD Directors remain available to assist the community with OHV registration as they already do.

Use of Grant Funds

Grant funds will be used to (1) replenish PPE, supplies and disposal fees for clean-up days, (2) two an EZ-up tents bearing the RAD and NV OHV Commission logo and RAD flags to stage all clean-up and registration drive events (which will also be utilized for RAD's other ongoing trail maintenance projects), and (3) the purchase of an enclosed trailer for the storage and transportation of all tools and supplies for clean-up projects and events. The trailer will also be used for RAD's separate trail maintenance projects.

Reno Area Dirtriders has observed that there are two main obstacles which hinder OHV registration compliance within our immediate community: (1) the paperwork and mailing requirement of the DMV process, particularly with regard to situations where VIN inspections are required, and (2) lack of public understanding of how OHV registration funds are used.

RAD seeks to host registration drives in partnership with law enforcement to promote OHV registration and provide education, assistance and facilitation to the public in order to generate increased registration compliance within the OHV community of Washoe County. Each registration drive will include the attendance by Directors of RAD, a notary public, and at least one law enforcement official, whereby RAD will be in a position to provide "one stop shopping" to enable OHV users overcome any questions or paperwork challenges/inconveniences which may have otherwise been preventing them from registering in the past.

RAD has a significant community following with an audience of approximately 2,500 OHV local users following its Facebook page, which is a key platform for outreach and education efforts and promotion of registration drives. RAD has always encouraged its members and audience to register their OHV's and has already provided assistance to multiple individuals in that regard.

The OHV community in this area suffers from the blight of illegal dumping of household garbage, furniture, appliances, tires, vehicles and RV's in recreation areas. The semi-annual clean-up events will occur in the Spring and Fall at areas on public land trail heads in Washoe County, Nevada determined to be in the greatest need at

such times in order to make the public lands and their trails clean and enjoyable for both OHV and non-OHV users.

This project is aimed primarily at outdoor ethics by promoting responsible OHV use in the form of annual registration compliance and good stewardship of recreation areas. Leading by example, RAD hopes to grow its community engagement and empower OHV users with education, resources and a sense of camaraderie about public lands.

I'm writing on behalf of Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful (KTMB) in support of the Reno Area Dirtriders' (RAD's) proposal for the "RAD Communities Project". We strongly support this grant application and its focus on improving the health of our public land by removing illegal dumpsites and encouraging responsible recreation in the greater Reno area.

Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful has focused on illegal activity on our public lands since our Illegal Dumping Task Force was first formed in 2006. The task force has representatives from all local organizations and municipalities with stock in this issue and has been integral to a series of preventative measures taken over the years. The task force has also identified dumping hot spots so KTMB could mobilize thousands of volunteers to clean up these sites. Groups like the Reno Area Dirtriders are indispensable in these efforts.

With our participation in this project, KTMB is committing to partnership on two community cleanups on public land. For each of the two cleanups, KTMB will provide a 40yd dumpster valued at \$525, 2 cases of contractor bags valued at \$52, and use of any of KTMB's extensive tool supply, including our sifting shovels valued at \$50 each.

Reno Area Dirtriders will be responsible for choosing the date and location for each cleanup and recruiting the volunteers, although KTMB is happy to share the opportunity with our network. RAD will also be responsible for leading the project on the dates chosen and scouting the sites prior to identify the exact locations of the dumpsites. Between these two cleanups, tens of thousands of pounds of illegally dumped waste will be removed from Washoe County's public land.

We look forward to continuing our partnership with you and reducing the blight that illegal dumping is contributing to our community.
